Mission to the Streets and Lanes of Auckland 1894. The Sisters of the Mission of the Good Shepherd.



In 1894 Frances Williams, Miriam Goss, Miss Salmon, Charlotte Halstead and Hannah Dawson set up a Mission to the Streets and Lanes of Auckland. Their Mission cottage door in Grey Street was open to all comers.

A few years later the Missioners became The Order of the Good Shepherd. The Sisters were innovative... pioneering services for working mothers and working amongst soldiers' wives in the Great War.

Mother Hannah died in 1938 after thirty-seven years at the head of the community. ...friend of the poor, spiritual adviser of many women in all stations of life, a counsellor... In the mid-fifties the community faced the difficult choice of shifting to Melbourne or dissolving the Order and returning to their own homes.

A few years later the Melbourne Community of the Holy Name opened a branch house in Auckland; its withdrawal a decade later reflected the decline of sisterhoods throughout the western world.

In 1950 Amy Campbell, a long-time supporter of the Community and close friend of Mother Hannah's died and left her Arney Road home to the Order. After much soul searching and the sale of the Greys Avenue property the Sisters moved to the Remuera house in 1958.

So began the life of The Hostel of the Holy Name to provide a residential home for Anglican girls coming from rural areas to study in Auckland.

On 20 November 1999 a thanks giving service was held to mark the closing of the Hostel of the Holy Name and to deconsecrate the Chapel of Jesus the Good shepherd.

The inheritance of the Order of the Good Shepherd and the Community of the Holy Name is available for new uses. In 1996 the claim for variation and clarification of the Holy Name trusts was settled in the courts and the Arney Road property was sold.

Dame Sylvia Cartwright's judgement on 10 April 1997 set down two parameters for the future administration of the Hostel of the Holy Name Trust.

1. *"The Trust is, however, to be construed as applying specifically to the cultivation and deepening of the devotional life amongst women associated together for the purpose of work of the Church in the Diocese of Auckland and for the benefit of girls and women generally."*

Examples of projects: Retreats, quiet days, workshops, establishing devotional literature and promoting ministry events for women.

2. *"To benefit a wide range of girls and women in all parts of the Diocese of Auckland."*

Examples of projects for Advocacy: Disability, violence, poverty, in relation to issues facing women and girls generally, for the promotion of women and girls on a social policy/government level, generating positive change and for and with women and girls on an individual and/or group level.

To meet the requirements of the Hostel of the Holy Name Trust applicant organisations must operate within the boundaries of the Diocese of Auckland. This incorporates the boundaries of Te Hui Amorangi o Te Tai Tokerau
