


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THE FIVE MARKS OF MISSION

LETTER FROM THE BISHOP

t is my pleasure to present the inaugural Review of Services and Activities for 2016 for the Anglican Diocese of Auckland.

The life of this Diocese began with the arrival of Bishop Selwyn, the first Bishop of New Zealand. He very quickly made Auckland his base, and established a vision for the establishment of a network of local churches to serve the spiritual and social needs of its people. His concern was for both indigenous Maori, and for the growing Pakeha settler community.

In our time, we are striving to develop and grow the Church in a way that remains responsive to the needs of wider society in a constantly changing environment. To be a truly modern church, we need to instinctively look outwards so that what we do has the wider community in mind.

The Anglican Church is one that embeds itself within the life of local communities. That is what the Anglican parish system is all about. The Diocese of Auckland the various regions to offer covers the area from the Far North to the Hauraki Plains and Coromandel Peninsula. There is no area in the Diocese for which establish the ways in which a local church is not responsible, the wider community can best that is, there is an Anglican Church community that will take responsibility in any place where Anglican ministry is sought or needed.

In order to help our churches to undertake this work more effectively, we have undertaken some changes in the organisation and structures of the Diocese in recent times. The team of people that works with the Bishops has a major focus on supporting and resourcing local Anglican churches in order to help them do their work as well as they can. Archdeacons work across pastoral care to clergy, and to assist each church community develop a mission edge to be served. In particular, one of the Archdeacons now works specifically with ministry units on review and planning for this purpose.

Significant changes have been made to our financial processes in order to provide for reporting in a consolidated way across the Diocese. Over 90 separate entities have been brought into a common accounting system, managed by Trust Management. This ensures compliance with the new reporting standards for charities, and has the benefit of providing greater support to local churches that struggle to secure the services of a Treasurer.

The focus of the Administrative Services Group at the Diocesan Office is on serving the local churches. They coordinate services related to personnel, property, and finance, as well as ensuring that the underpinning of good administrative

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infrastructure is in place to manage our scattered life well.

A particular highlight from this past year has been the completion of building work at Holy Trinity Cathedral. The completed Cathedral, in a debt-free position, allows for the opportunity to consecrate the building which will occur in October 2017.

Nevertheless our major concern continues to be for people, and this is work that is carried out in our local churches. It is undertaken across the age ranges, providing support for young families and children, work with teenagers and young adults, and many groups for older people to gather in order to combat social isolation. Many of our churches run or contribute to food banks to assist people and families in crisis.

The church's core business continues to be the offering of worship to God, and the nurture

of people in Christian faith, so that they have something to give to others beyond themselves. Christian faith has at the heart of its spirituality the love of neighbour and the service of others.

Some of our churches have been struggling to maintain good attendances and sustain the critical mass that can allow them to fulfil their aspirations within their communities. In common with other charities, there are many compliance issues to be met with their related costs. The Diocese is the steward of much property heritage which we seek to make available to the wider community, while holding the tension of ensuring that buildings remain fit for purpose for the church in a contemporary age. Many of our churches and clergy are developing clever entrepreneurial ways of addressing these issues.

With a current focus on the seismic integrity of buildings around the country, we are working to identify those buildings which will need to have strengthening work done and to gain a scope of the cost of that work to ensure that we meet our obligations within the standards set by the government.

We believe we have a very hopeful future. There is considerable commitment and hope among the people of the Diocese within the many communities in which they worship and offer their ministry. We will continue to resource and strengthen the people of those local churches to assist them in their work

DIOCESAN COUNCIL REPORT

The 2016 year has been one of change for our Diocese and the Diocesan Council is encouraged by the willingness of all to take on new ways of doing things.

Each September, our Diocese meets as a synod with clergy and lay representation from across our Diocese. One of the objectives of Synod is to decide and communicate our Diocese's position on issues that impact our communities.

Last Synod, key resolutions included encouraging ministry units to become members of the Living Wage movement; encouraging increased gender equality and representation within our Ministry Units and at diocesan events; calling upon the government to provide affordable housing for low income New Zealanders; and asking Ministry Units to liaise with other communitybased organisations on the issue of homelessness. These declarations provide our Diocese with a voice on national issues, validate the work of local ministry and allow new ministries enjoy and treasure. However, to be created.

Meeting the new accounting standards and charity reporting requirements has been a key piece of work for the Diocese. Ministry Units and Trust Management are to be congratulated for the way they successfully adopted and implemented the new systems and worked together to solve challenges. This new way of working has also provided an opportunity to network and share ideas in a way that would never have happened before.

Keeping people and the spaces they use safe is a core value of our Diocese, and as a Council we are committed to providing expertise and resources to foster this. In 2016, we formed a dedicated working group to implement a safety plan across the Diocese in line with the new legislation. The level of participation and engagement from Ministry Units so far has been encouraging.

Our Diocese has many heritage buildings, which we are entrusted to protect as a part of our nation's history and for all to our buildings can present costly and logistical challenges in terms of maintenance. Ministry

Units continue to take restorative action and are faithful guardians in their management of these resources.

Our Archives, Te Whare Kahurangi, which holds records for our Diocese and Te Pihopatanga o Te Tai Tokerau, celebrated 15 years since the opening of the purposebuilt repository in Parnell. This valuable research facility, available to our Diocese and the wider community, has reported a significant uptake of users over the last couple of years.

Our Diocese continues to create and resource ministry opportunities to ensure an Anglican presence in all corners of our Diocese. We acknowledge that this would not be possible without our local volunteers and we take this chance to thank them for their hard work and dedication.

Diocesan Council is satisfied with our year-end result as it demonstrates careful stewardship of resources and good management of assets. This result allows us to continue to provide ministry through a wide range of community support programmes and services.

WHO WE ARE



The Auckland Diocese is one of the seven Tikanga Pakeha Dioceses within the Anglican Church in Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia. Each Ministry Unit within the Diocese has its own governing body which provides governance and oversees management at a local level. Representatives of the Auckland Diocese meet annually at Synod, where they conduct the governance business of the Diocese. Diocesan Council administers the governance responsibilities between annual Synod sessions.



MINISTRY UNITS

Ministry Units are the heart of the Diocese, it is through them that the community is reached. They offer a huge variety of support services, from worship, to counselling, food banks and many others. They are passionate about actively meeting the needs of their community.



DIOCESAN COUNCIL

The main business of the Council is to make decisions around property and asset management, financial oversight of the diocesan accounts, health and safety matters, various parish matters, and the appointment of people to Trust Boards and Anglican entities across the Diocese.

The Episcopal Team is made up of the Bishops, Archdeacons and Ministry Educator. Together they oversee all the Ministry Units within the Auckland





FINANCING OUR MINISTRY

The revenue and outgoings for the Diocesan Council of the Anglican Diocese of Auckland shows the consolidated statements comprising the Council and its 118 entities for the year ended 31st December 2016.

The 118 entities include 84 Ministry Units (churches), as well as charitable trusts, trust boards and cemetery trust boards. Funds held by individual entities are available only for that entity's purpose. Funds with a specific purpose, such as bequests, are committed to be spent for the purpose orginally intended and are managed accordingly.
