Deepening the work of the Anglican Church within the Anglican Diocese of Auckland, Te Pihopatanga o Te Tai Tokerau, The Diocese of Polynesia in Auckland



HOSTEL HISTORY

In 1894 Frances Williams, Miriam Goss, Miss Salmon, Charlotte Halstead and Hannah Dawson set up a Mission to the Streets and Lanes of Auckland - The Sisters of the Mission of the Good Shepherd. Their Mission cottage door was open to all comers.



The Sisters moved to Remuera in 1958. So began the life of The Hostel of the Holy Name to provide a residential home for Anglican girls coming from rural areas to study in Auckland.

On 20 November 1999 a thanksgiving service was held to mark the closing of the Hostel of the Holy Name and to deconsecrate the Chapel of Jesus the Good shepherd.

The inheritance of the Order of the Good Shepherd and the Community of the Holy Name is available for new uses. In 1996 the claim for variation and clarification of the Holy Name trusts was settled in the courts and the property was sold.

THE TRUST TODAY

The Hostel of the Holy Name Advisory Group consider applications and make recommendations for funding to the General Trust Board based on specific criteria.

Dame Sylvia Cartwright's judgement on 10 April 1997 set down two parameters for the future administration of the Hostel of the Holy Name Trust:

The Trust is construed as applying specifically to the cultivation and deepening of the devotional life amongst women associated together for the purpose of work of the Church in the Anglican Diocese of Auckland, and for the benefit of girls and women.

Examples of applications for funds:

Retreats, quiet days, workshops, establishing devotional literature and promoting ministry events for women. Disability, violence, poverty, in relation to issues facing women and girls, for the promotion of women and girls on a social policy/government level, generating positive change and for and with women and girls on an individual and/or group level.

To meet the requirements of the Hostel of the Holy Name Trust applicant organisations must operate within the boundaries and have a clear link to the Anglican Diocese of Auckland. This incorporates the boundaries of Te Hui Amorangi o Te Tai Tokerau.

HOW TO APPLY

Applications for funding are invited twice annually, with applications closing on 1st March and 1st September.

A consideration for funding decisions is Anglican Faith-based organisations or projects.

Consideration will be given to requests for developmental funding for specific projects, however, funding of such a project would generally only be for one year. On rare occasions funding might be considered for up to three years.
