Our Parish

Ministry Team

St Aidan's has traditionally been a two priest parish. The Rev'd Dr Kim Benton is currently the priest in charge following the retirement of our Vicar in February 2026. The Priest Associate is the Rev'd Wesley Fifita.

The clergy team is supported by the following paid positions:

- Full-time Parish Administrator
- Part-time (5 hours/wk) Children's Ministry Coordinator (a role currently filled by the Rev'd Christina Turner who is a Priest Assistant as well as the Children & Families Minister)
- Part-time (5 hours/wk) Youth Leader
- Part-time (5 hours/wk) mainly music Coordinator
- Part-time (3 hours/wk) Website and Social Media Content Manager

The parish also benefits greatly from the services of a non-stipendiary priest (Rev'd Anne Priestley) and a non-stipendiary Priest Assistant (Rev'd Christina Turner). Both participate actively in our worship life.

At present Vestry is structured so that various sub-committees oversee a specific area of church life. These include Synod, finance, property, health and safety, and personnel.

Sunday Service and Worship

There are two Sunday services at St Aidan's. Both services are based on the liturgies from A *New Zealand Prayer Book* to varying degrees. Laypeople are involved as Liturgists, Intercessors, Readers, Chalice Assistants and Prayer Ministers.

8am Holy Communion Service – a more traditional service.

9:30am Holy Communion Family Service – with separate simultaneous programmes for youth and children. This service has the larger congregation.

The 8am and 9:30am services share a time of morning tea and fellowship in the Gathering Area following each service. These also provide an opportunity to meet newcomers, catch up on activities of interest, and celebrate significant occasions.



A small but dedicated group of staff and parishioners attend prayers at 9am on Thursdays, either joining online via Zoom or meeting in the Gathering Area, and monthly mid-week service, followed by soup and toast lunch, on the first Wednesday of each month.

St Aidan's also offers a comprehensive timetable of services based on the liturgical calendar. Services are held throughout Easter, Holy Week, Advent and the Christmas season. Our ANZAC service to commemorate The Fallen is remarkably well attended by both parishioners and the wider community.

Our Priorities

Our 2026 Parish consultation identified many consistent themes from our previous consultation conducted in 2022. Our six key priorities for the immediate future are:

1. Attracting and retaining new parishioners, with a particular focus on growing our youth, children, and families so as to maintain the intergenerational nature of our congregation, which is valued so highly by our Church family.
2. Maintaining our outward focus as a Church and the sense of community within our Church through the ongoing support and strengthening of our many ministries at St Aidan's.
3. Worship services that are nurturing to people's faith with strong liturgy, well-constructed sermons, and music that integrates traditional and modern and does it well.
4. Provision of timely, practical, and considered pastoral care that draws on the many willing volunteers within the Parish.
5. Ongoing maintenance of our building facilities to ensure they continue to support our worship, caring, and mission objectives. Our highest current priority is the replacement of our Church roof.
6. Strengthening the financial position of our Parish to ensure we are sustainable and remain relevant. An important priority that has emerged since our 2022 consultation relates to the strengthening of our financial position, which is an acknowledgement of the deficit incurred in 2025 and forecast for 2026. It is acknowledged that this trend needs to be reversed to ensure that our current level of staff resourcing can be maintained. The new Vicar will have an integral role in providing the strategic leadership to achieve this outcome.

The consultation revealed an appetite for change as long as it is gradual and does not destroy the existing sense of community.

As with previous Parish consultations, the 2026 consultation included reference to the Healthy Church Model. Within this construct, the consultation identified priorities as including:

Shaping Community

- Needs to be our focus at the moment to allow us to rebuild our foundation and community.
- Prioritise increasing the congregation by reaching out to the local community with strong leadership driving this.

Knowing God

- Review timing and structure of services to ensure we are providing appropriately for a diverse congregation.

Growing in Christ

- Nurture and grow the next generations through strong youth and children's ministries, extending opportunities for roles for young people in the church, and ensuring there are choices of worship styles offered.
- To prioritise activities to maintain and enhance engagement and relevance, so that we continue to grow in a sustainable manner as a parish that's intergenerational, active and diverse.

Living Beyond Ourselves

- Keep looking outwards and continue to strengthen our support of the mission groups we are working with.
- Continue to look for opportunities to connect with local businesses and community groups.

Children, Youth and Young Adult Ministries

Kids' Church

Kids' Church happens every Sunday during term time during the 9:30am service, organised and run by the Children's Ministry Coordinator. Children are between the ages of 3-12 years old with preschool children participating with supervision from a parent. There are around 6-10 children who regularly attend this programme. The programme finishes in time for the children to join their parents for Communion.

During the year, some Sunday 9:30am services aim to include the children more with a Kid's Talk led by the Vicar before they go out for their session. When suitable, the children also like to share what they learnt during their session with the rest of the congregation by presenting their crafts at the end of the service. In February each year we have a 'Blessing of the backpacks and devices' for children, students, and educators starting the new school year, and on Christmas Eve there is a special child-focused service at 4pm.



mainly music

This outreach ministry for the wider community is organised and run by our mainly music Coordinator, volunteers, and supported by a group of retired parishioners who serve morning tea. This is held on Wednesday mornings at 9:30am during term time, and consists of half singing, dancing and a “Surprise Box”, and half morning tea, craft activities and free play in the Hall afterwards.

mainly music currently has approximately fourteen families registered with a smaller number attending on a regular basis.

Youth Group

The Youth programmes are run by the Youth Leader who is responsible for the planning and delivery of Sunday Youth Group (during the 9:30am service) and also ad hoc youth activities. The youth programme is aimed at ages 11-18 year olds and currently only has a small number of regular attendees with a number of youth having left for tertiary study in recent years. They are well connected to the wider Diocese and participate in events such as E-fest and Diowhodunnit.

During the year some Sunday 9:30am services specifically involve members of the Youth Group, who are asked to help out with liturgy, prayers, and readings. The Youth Group also help with fundraising events such as the Annual Garage Sale and Quiz Nights.

Young Adults Group

Our Young Adults Group meets bi-weekly for Bible study and discussion, as well as periodically for social activities. They also regularly attend the Auckland Dioceses' Community of Ordinary Saints group (COS).

Overall

While all these groups are currently active, St Aidan's has seen a decline in numbers across all of these age groups over the past few years. We hope to build up our numbers again with the help of our new Vicar to ensure the church stays relevant and active in the future.

Our Buildings



The Church

St Aidan's is a beautiful Church, dating to 1905, located on the corner of Ascot Avenue and Remuera Road, Remuera. The traditional wooden building with its stunning stained glass windows makes it one of the most beautiful parish churches in Auckland. 'The Bunker', in the basement of the Church, is the meeting place for the Young Adults group and the Youth Group on a Sunday.

Gathering Area

The Gathering Area is a modern addition, which connects the church with the hall complexes. Originally opened in 2005, the Gathering Area was further enhanced in early 2024 with a new expanded kitchen facility that was fully funded through the generous gifts of parishioners. This welcoming space hosts numerous parish activities, such as serving morning tea after each Sunday morning service, a meeting space for the Lenten studies and home groups, and our Pins and Needles group. The annual Pet Service is also held in the Gathering Area. It can be used as an overflow for large funeral services, with sound and video able to be projected into it. There is a well-resourced library, which is well used within the parish.

The Hall, Social Lounge and Offices

This is a multipurpose facility, comprising a large Hall (with a stage area and an attached kitchen), a Mission Shop, a Social Lounge (and attached kitchenette), an administrative office downstairs and offices and a meeting space upstairs. The Hall is used for many parish events such as the Annual Garage Sale, St Aidan's Day lunch, the Annual Quiz Night and our weekly Mainly Music group. The Hall and Social Lounge are hired by many community groups for dancing, martial arts etc. and this is a significant source of income for the parish.

Building Projects

Following the recent completion of the new kitchen in the Gathering Area, the new unisex toilets in the hall complex, and the refurbished hall kitchen, Vestry is focused on maintaining a level of momentum in undertaking works that ensure our buildings continue to provide for our needs. Planning is currently progressing for the replacement of our Church roof, which has started to fail and is no longer water-tight.

Vicarage and Clergy House

The Vicarage is a generous family home, purpose-built in the early 1990s, located directly across the road from the church at 6 Ascot Avenue. The ground floor comprises a large study, a lounge/dining room, an open plan family room and kitchen, with a fenced outdoor courtyard and mature garden. Additionally, there is a large guest bedroom with ensuite, laundry with toilet and a double garage. Upstairs there are four good-sized bedrooms (master has an ensuite) and a shared bathroom. There are built-in wardrobes and storage in every bedroom.

The church also owns the Clergy House at 8 Ascot Avenue, which shares a driveway with the Vicarage. This is a spacious three bedroom, one bathroom, house with a sunny lounge, and a large dining area adjacent to the kitchen. There is also a carport and parking for a second vehicle.

This either houses the Priest Assistant or is rented at market value giving another source of income to the parish.

Our Local Community

School Zones

The Vicarage is in excellent school zones for children of all ages.

- Remuera Primary School is approximately 1km away
- Remuera Intermediate School is a 5-minute walk away, straight down Ascot Avenue.
- Auckland Grammar School and Epsom Girls' Grammar are within easy bus routes down Remuera Road.

Other schools nearby are St Kentigern School for Girls, St Kentigern School for Boys, Kings School, and Baradene College.

Remuera Village

Remuera Shopping Centre is a short walk away, with a New World supermarket, the Remuera Library, and a convenient selection of amenities such as banks, pharmacies, grocers, restaurants, cafes, takeaways, and clothing, book, jewellery and gift shops.

Transport

Transport services in the area are excellent; the Greenlane motorway on and off-ramps are a 5-minute drive to get you easily on the State Highway 1 motorway and there is a bus stop on Remuera Road near the rear church driveway, with regular buses using the route. Newmarket and the City Centre are a convenient bus journey or short drive away. A choice of three railway stations are close by, with access to Eastern and Southern railway lines.



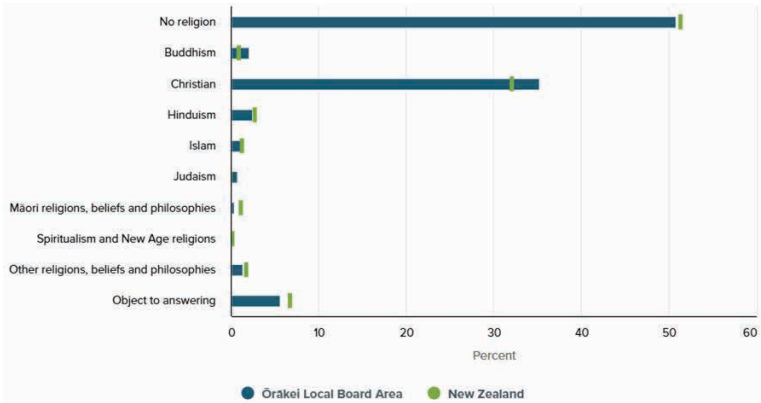
Population

Remuera is an inner city suburb of Auckland, located six kilometres southeast of the city centre. The suburb has numerous green spaces, most obvious of which is Ōhinerau / Mount Hobson – a volcanic cone with views from the top overlooking Waitematā Harbour and Rangitoto. The suburb extends from Hobson Bay and the Orakei Basin on the Waitematā Harbour to the north and east, to the main thoroughfare of State Highway 1 in the southwest. It is surrounded by the suburbs of Orakei, Meadowbank, Saint Johns, Mount Wellington, Ellerslie, Greenlane, Epsom, Newmarket and Parnell.

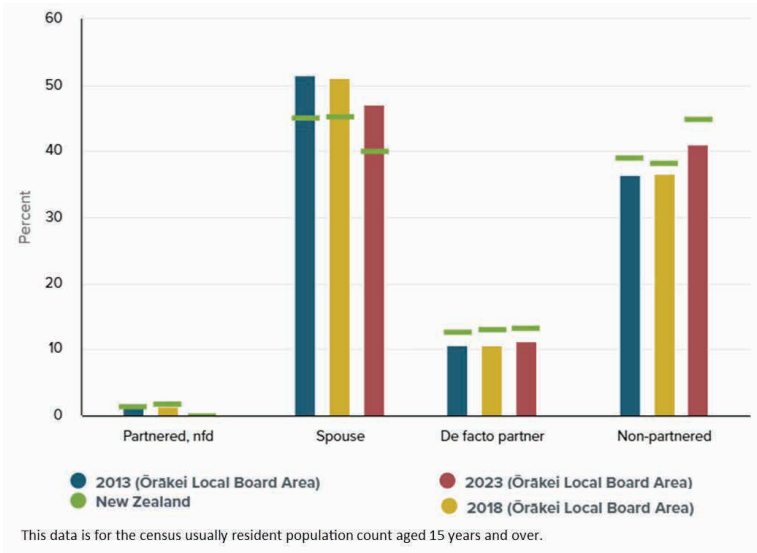

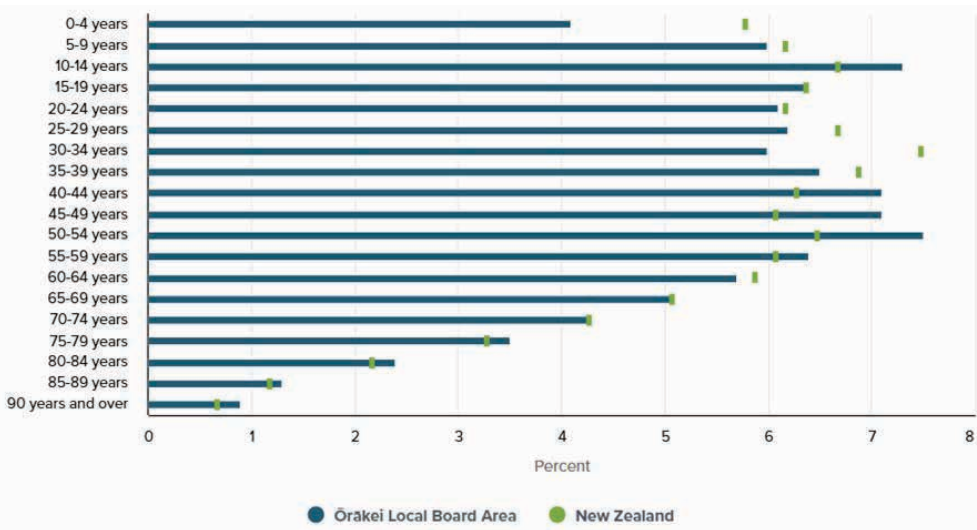
Percentage of population by religious affiliation



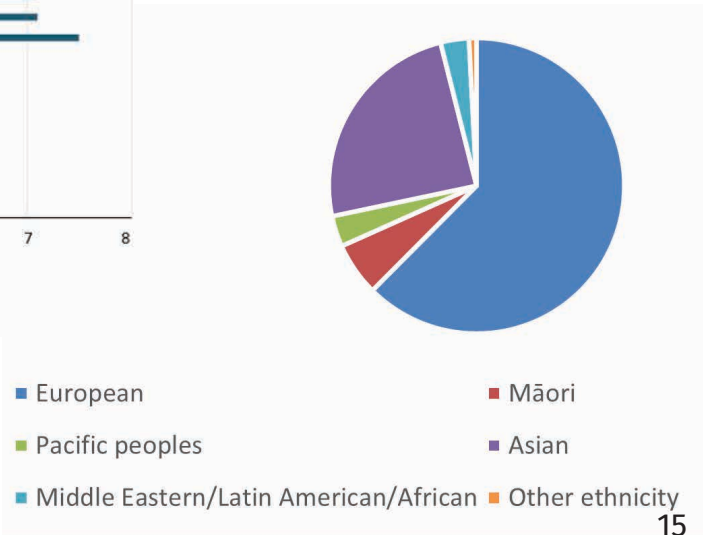
Percentage of population by partnership status in current relationship

Ōrākei Local Board Area Ethnic Groups

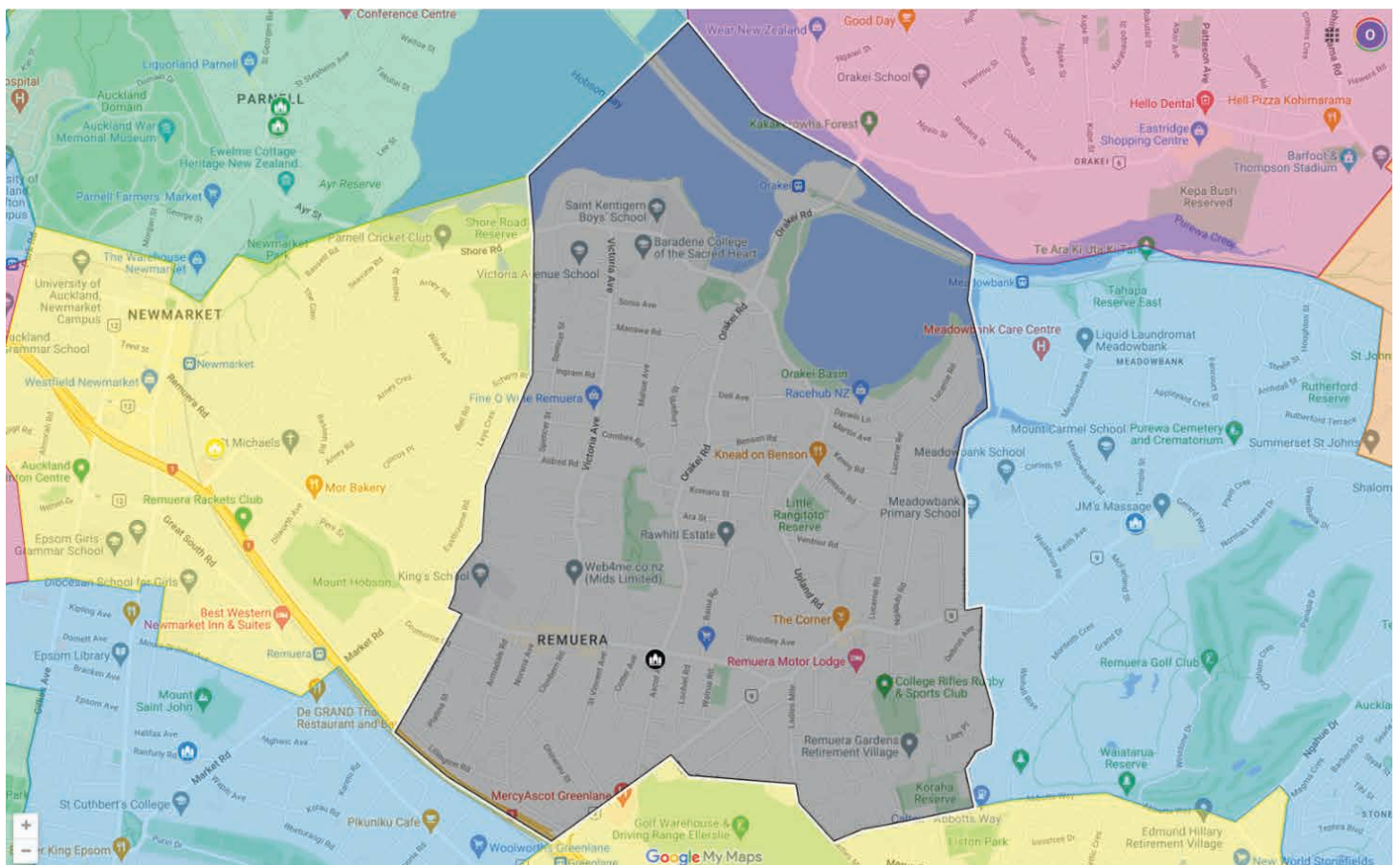


Parish Boundaries

The St Aidan's Parish boundary is shown in grey in the map below. It is little changed from the traditional boundary extending to Omaha and Portland Roads in the West, Ngapiapi Rd in the north, Koraha St and Ngāpuhi Rd through to Orakei Basin in the east, and the Southern Motorway, Ellerslie Racecourse, and Abbotts Way in the south. The boundaries include the eastern two thirds of the suburb of Remuera.

It is bounded by the Parishes of St Mark, Remuera (to the west), St Chad, Meadowbank (to the east), St George, Epsom, and Christ Church, Ellerslie (to the south), and is part of the Central Auckland Cluster Group with oversight from the Northern Archdeacon.

Like many Anglican churches, a good proportion of parishioners (approximately 40%) travel from outside the parish boundaries.

Our History

St Aidan's, Remuera has been an independent ministry unit since 1912 when a parochial district was formed from the mother parish of St Mark, Remuera. It was given parish status as early as 1915. Originally, St Mark's parish was much bigger as its boundaries then included the area now covered by the parishes of St Mark, St Aidan, St George Epsom, and St Chad Meadowbank.

The Remuera area develops

As the population of Auckland grew, the weekend houses in Remuera began to be replaced by larger homes on large sections, giving it a semi-rural atmosphere. St Mark's had purchased a section in Victoria Avenue for future development.

Elsewhere in the parish a Mission Hall was built on Mr J Wilson's property in Shore Road (now the site of St Kentigern's School) and used from 1859 as a chapel for Hobson Bay-Lower Remuera area. Services also began in 1885 in the Remuera Social hall at the top of Ōrākei Road.

St Aidan's Remuera

However, the people of 'Upper Remuera' made their own plans and services began in a hall in 1898. In 1903 a section was purchased on the corner of Remuera and Ascot Avenue. St Aidan's Church was dedicated on 29 June 1905. A resident priest was appointed in 1906. Significant alterations were carried out in 1910, and the sanctuary dedicated on 21 December 1912, and the church consecrated on 2 September 1956.

Financial Reports

Treasurer's report for the year ended 31 December 2025

Key Points to note:

- Year 2025 shows a deficit of (\$65,000) compared to a surplus of \$18,000 in 2024
- The Budget for 2026 shows a further increase in Deficit of (\$90,000)
- The main reason for the increasing deficit is because of Offerings declining by 13% and the high church operations costs
- To avoid a high deficit we have to either increase income or reduce costs
- The roof needs replacement. Will cost around \$250,000 to \$300,000
- Owing to generous donations over the years, we have Reserves of \$400,000. But we are beginning to use up some reserves for church operations

Statement of Accounting Policies

Parish of St Aidan Remuera

For the year ended 31 December 2025

General Accounting Policies

The following general accounting policies shall be applied in the preparation of all financial reports for the Ministry Unit.

1. Basis of Preparation – Consolidated Statements

The consolidated financial statements of the Diocesan Council are to be prepared in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Practice in New Zealand.

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Public Benefit Entity (PBE) Standards Tier 1. The criteria under which the Diocesan Council is eligible to report in accordance with PBE Standards Tier 1 are:

- The Diocesan Council has no public accountability;
- The Diocesan Council is large (expenses more than \$30m)

2. Measurement Base

The basis of measurement and reporting of financial performance and financial position of the Ministry Unit will be on a historical cost basis with the exception that certain investments will be revalued.

Specific Accounting Policies

3. Financial Assets

Investments

The Ministry Unit's investments shall be categorised as Available-for-Sale financial assets. When a financial asset is recognised initially, the Ministry Unit shall measure it at its fair value plus transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition. Subsequent to initial recognition investments are recognised and derecognised on trade date where purchase or sale of an investment is under a contract whose terms require delivery of the investment within the timeframe established by the market. Assets Available-for-Sale are stated at fair value. Gains and losses arising from changes in fair value are recognised in the net profit for the year except for impairment losses and foreign exchange gains and losses, until the financial asset is derecognised, at which time the cumulative gain or loss previously recognised in other comprehensive revenue and expense shall be recognised in surplus or deficit. Some investments may have restrictions on their use that would require approval from the Diocesan Council.

Loans and Receivables

Loans and Receivables shall be recorded at amortised cost less impairment (bad and doubtful debts).

4. Financial Liabilities

Trade payables and other accounts payable are recognised when the Ministry Unit becomes obliged to make future payments resulting from the purchase of goods and services. Trade payables and other payments are recognised at amortised cost.

5. Investment Property

Investment property is property (land or a building – or part of a building – or both) owned to earn rentals or for capital appreciation, or both, rather than for:

- (a) Use in the production or supply of goods or services, or for administrative purposes; or
- (b) Sale in the ordinary course of operations.

After initial recognition, the Ministry Unit shall choose as its accounting policy the cost model and shall apply that policy to all of its investment properties.

Investment properties shall be derecognised when they have either been disposed of or when the investment property is permanently withdrawn from use and no future benefit is expected from its disposal.

Any gains or losses on derecognising an investment property shall be included in the surplus of the Ministry Unit in the year in which they arise.

The legal title of the investment properties is generally under the General Trust Board of the Diocese of Auckland for the use of the Ministry Unit.

6. Fixed Assets

Land & buildings and all other property, plant and equipment are stated at cost, less accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses. The cost of property, plant and equipment is the purchase cost, together with any incidental costs of acquisition.

Where an asset is acquired through a non-exchange transaction, its cost shall be measured at its fair value as at the date of acquisition.

Depreciation is calculated so as to write down the cost of property, plant and equipment, less any assigned residual value, on a straight-line basis over the expected useful economic lives of the assets concerned. Freehold land is not depreciated.

The depreciation rates used are based on the estimated useful lives of the assets, are as follows:

Buildings: 2% on cost	Building Improvements – 2% to 20% on cost
Motor Vehicles - 20% on cost	Furniture & Equipment - 20% to 36% on cost
Computer – 25% on cost	

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted as appropriate, at each reporting date.

Property, plant and equipment is reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount.

The legal title of the land and buildings is generally under the General Trust Board of the Diocese of Auckland for the use of the Ministry Unit.

7. Goods and Services Tax (GST)

All items in the Balance Sheet shall be stated exclusive of GST, with the exception of receivables and payables, which include GST.

Non recoverable GST shall be reported as an operating expense.

8. Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised and measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable to the extent it is probable that the future economic benefits or service potential associated with the asset will flow to the Ministry Unit and the fair value of the asset can be reliably measured.

Non exchange transactions:

(In a non-exchange transaction, an entity either receives value from another entity without directly giving approximately equal value in exchange, or gives value to another entity without directly receiving approximately equal value in exchange.)

An inflow of resources from a non-exchange transaction recognised as an asset shall be recognised as revenue, except to the extent that a liability is also recognised in respect of the same inflow.

Interest income:

Interest income is recognised as it accrues, using the effective interest method.

Distribution income:

Distributions income is recognised on the date that the Ministry Unit's right to receive payment is established.

Grant and donation income:

Grant and donations income is recognised as income when it becomes receivable unless the Ministry Unit has a liability to repay the grant if the requirements of the grant or donation are not fulfilled. A liability is recognised to the extent that such conditions are unfulfilled at the end of the reporting period.

Bequests and Estates income:

Bequests/Estates are recognised in the statement of financial performance when probate of the will has been granted, receipt of the bequest is probable and the amount of the bequest can be measured reliably. Where bequests are provided for the purpose of setting up a specific Trust fund the income is recognised as equity of that fund.

When the Ministry Unit acts as in the capacity of an agent rather than the principal in the transaction, the revenue and expenses are recognised as the net amount rather than separate income and expenses.

9. Tax

The Diocesan Council is a registered charitable entity with the DIA Charities (Registration No: CC31449). As a registered charitable entity the Diocesan Council is exempt from Income Tax.

10. Reserves

The Ministry Unit equity shall be split between General Funds and Special Funds.

General Funds:

General Funds are amounts available for distribution at the discretion of the Ministry Unit.

Special Funds:

Funds directly paid or received into the trust fund investment accounts managed by the Ministry Unit are recognised or derecognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income. The Ministry Unit has committed to spending the funds on the purpose intended when originally donated and has therefore recorded them separately from other retained earnings. Funds held for a particular purpose are recorded in Special Funds as a separate reserve in equity.
